MONDAY COURSES

HW-481 | ***FFXP's Swing Into Health** with Susan Krusko

10 sessions | 3/2 - 5/4 | 9:00 AM - 10:00 AM | \$75 | **Online; Recorded**

This fun-filled program offers an energizing workout for all levels! Move to the music of the 50s - 70s using balls, bands, weights, or creative props like towels and bottles. Boost cardio, strength, and imagination in a joyful, supportive environment!

NEW PR-406 | ***Moses: An Unlikely Character** with Craig Miller

10 sessions | 3/2 - 5/4 | 10:15 AM - 11:45 AM | \$112 | **Online; Recorded**

This course will immerse students in a folkloric Moses for whom no historical evidence exists. We will delve into biblical/post-biblical materials, probing the ancient formation and impact of this diverse, malleable persona on Judaic, Christian, and contemporary perceptions.

NEW LW-413 | **Ekphrastic Writing: Write Fiction, Memoir, Essays, or Poetry Inspired by Images** with Gabriella Brand

9 sessions | 3/9 - 5/4 | 12:00 PM - 1:30 PM | \$101 | **Online**

Personal photos, famous paintings, nature photos or clips in a magazine...writers will take their inspiration from a variety of images. Gabriella Brand will guide the process and encourage students to discover their preferred genre. This course is open to writers of all experience levels.

NEW OO-026 | **Ghosts in the White House: The People Behind Presidential Speeches (Osher Online)** with Diana Carlin, PhD

6 sessions | 3/30 - 5/4* | 3:00 PM - 4:30 PM | \$68 | **Online**

Have you ever wondered who writes presidential speeches? This course traces the evolution of speechwriting from George Washington's administration to today. Yes, Hamilton helped draft Washington's Farewell Address, but no, Lincoln did not scribble the Gettysburg Address on an envelope. We will study the writing process presidents used and examine drafts from FDR, Truman, Eisenhower, Kennedy, Carter, and George H.W. Bush. We will view clips from speeches and from former White House speechwriters describing the process.

TUESDAY COURSES

MU-420 | **Immigrants in America - Stories of Jazz, Blues, Rock and Popular Culture** with Emanuel Abramovits

5 sessions | 3/3 - 3/31 | 8:30 AM - 10:00 AM | \$56 | **Online; Recorded**

Join me to explore how minority influences revolutionized 20th-century music and entertainment. Drawing on decades of experience and rich audiovisuals, we'll uncover the legacy of iconic artists, producers, and labels shaping Rock, Pop, Blues, and Jazz.

HS-525 | **The Magic Behind the Footlights - Backstage Secrets of Waterbury's Storied Palace Theater** with Donna Cameron

4 sessions | 3/10 - 3/31 | 11:00 AM - 12:30 PM | \$45 | **In-Person, Off-Site**

This course will include a slideshow of restoration and old theater photos, an architectural tour, a partial viewing of a load-in of a Broadway show, and a look into the life of Sylvester Z. Poli, the theater's original builder and operator. There will also be a Q&A with the Palace CEO.

NEW OO-032 | **The Scopes Monkey Trial: Then and Now** ([Osher Online](#)) with Douglas Mishkin, JD

6 sessions | 3/31 - 5/5* | 11:00 AM - 12:30 PM | \$68 | **Online**

In July 1925, Clarence Darrow, William Jennings Bryan, and others converged on Dayton, Tennessee, for the Scopes Monkey Trial - an eight-day clash over religion, science, public education, free speech, and textbooks broadcast nationwide. One hundred years later, these debates continue. This course explores why the trial happened in Dayton, how Bryan and Darrow became involved, what occurred in the courtroom, whether *Inherit the Wind* reflects reality, who won and lost, and why it still matters today.

LW-516 | **Is There A Recipe for Writing? Let's Find Out!** with Nancy T Whitney

10 sessions | 3/3 - 5/5 | 12:00 PM - 1:30 PM | \$112 | **Online**

I encourage my students to find their own style of writing, poetry, prose or what they want to write. In this course, we'll also explore new ways of expressive writing.

AH-456 | **Riverside Cemetery: A Museum of Art, History and Nature** with Martin Begnal

5 sessions | 4/7 - 5/5 | 12:00 PM - 1:30 PM | \$56 | **In-Person, Off-Site**

This class will be taught onsite at Riverside Cemetery, a 36-acre National Historic site and arboretum dedicated in 1853 and built as part of the Rural Cemetery Movement of the mid-19th century.

NEW VA-404 | ***Mastering the Use of Color Exploration** with Lisa Arnold

5 sessions | 3/3 - 3/31 | 1:45 PM - 3:15 PM | \$56 | **Online**

So many are confused with the properties of color mixing. In these sessions, students will learn how to mix and create the colors of their choice to enhance their work. Basic paint or drawing sets do not provide you with many color choices unless you mix and match. Come learn how!

***NEW* OO-033 | Comic Book Literature (Osher Online)** with Arnold Blumberg, PhD

6 sessions | 3/31 - 5/5* | 3:00 PM - 4:30 PM | \$68 | [Online](#)

Comics (blending words and pictures to tell stories) stretch from cave paintings and the Bayeux Tapestry to today's Batman and Spider-Man. Far more than superhero tales, comics are a versatile literary artform, capturing intimate and epic stories, social issues, and cultural moments through panels and word balloons. In this course, we will trace their history, explore their power, and read and discuss works including *Understanding Comics*, *Watchmen*, *Maus*, *Fun Home*, and *Persepolis*.

***NEW* HS-411 | The Words We Live By: The History, Structure, and Development of the U.S. Constitution** with Richard D. McCann

2 sessions | 4/7 - 4/14 | 1:45 PM - 3:15 PM | \$23 | [Online](#)

This two-part course will explore the history of the United States Constitution, its structure, key clauses, and evolution as a governing document. It will also explain the development of the Bill of Right and subsequent Constitutional Amendments.

***NEW* HW-401 | Eat Plants: Prevent and Reverse Chronic Disease with a Whole Food Plant-Based Lifestyle!** with Denise Rose

8 sessions | 3/10 - 4/28 | 4:00 PM - 6:00 PM | \$120 | [Online](#); [Recorded](#)

This course teaches the evidence-based scientific reasons for why eating a whole food, plant-based (WFPB) diet significantly lowers risk for chronic disease. It also presents strategies for designing and eating a well-balanced, plant-based diet through the use of shared recipes.

***NEW* OO-025 | From Leo XIII to Leo XIV: History of 20th and 21st Century Popes (Osher Online)** with Oliva Espín, PhD

6 sessions | 4/7 - 5/12* | 5:00 PM - 6:30 PM | \$68 | [Online](#)

The death of Pope Francis and the election of the first U.S.-born Pope have been in the news repeatedly in the last few months, capturing the imagination of many people, including non-Catholics. Who are these men? What are their life stories? How were they similar to and different from each other? In this course, we will discuss the lives and dominant perspectives of the last ten Popes, exploring their most significant positions and their influence on world affairs.

***NEW* OO-024 | Frank Lloyd Wright and Modern Architecture (Osher Online)** with Jennifer Gray, PhD

6 sessions | 4/21 - 5/26* | 7:00 PM - 8:30 PM | \$68 | [Online](#)

Frank Lloyd Wright designed nearly 1,000 buildings and helped define modern architecture. This course explores highlights of his practice, from Prairie houses to Fallingwater and the Guggenheim Museum, alongside lesser-known projects like affordable housing and city planning. We'll examine how Wright's work reflected cultural shifts in technology, science, and politics, offering a deeper understanding of his lasting influence on architecture and modern design.

WEDNESDAY COURSES

NEW PD-408 | **Journey to Self Discovery** with Stacey Altomari

10 sessions | 3/4 - 5/6 | 10:15 AM - 11:45 AM | \$112 | [Online](#)

Who am I? How did my life unfold? What was, and is, my role in it? These are questions towards a journey of "self" discovery. Why not get to truly know who YOU are? YOU are a unique version of the "I am" and deserving of discovery. I'm here to walk beside you.

NEW OO-021 | **A History of Street Art** ([Osher Online](#)) with Heather Shirey, PhD

6 sessions | 4/1 - 5/6* | 11:00 AM - 12:30 PM | \$68 | [Online](#)

Art in the streets (including graffiti, murals, stickers, and paste-ups) gives voice to marginalized communities, shapes urban environments, and challenges institutional norms. This course explores graffiti and street art in the U.S. and around the world, examining their histories, motivations, and social impact. Participants will consider the rise of global mural movements, efforts to preserve and present street art, and its evolving role in activism, community identity, and social change.

NEW OO-030 | **Siberia: Russia's Frozen Wasteland or Economic Heartland?** ([Osher Online](#))

with Asya Pereltsvaig, PhD

6 sessions | 4/1 - 5/6* | 1:00 PM - 2:30 PM | \$68 | [Online](#)

Siberia covers three quarters of Russia's territory but is home to only a quarter of its population. Yet its role in shaping Russia as a vast and wealthy empire is profound. In this course, we will explore Siberia's economic significance, indigenous cultures, and history as a penal colony, along with its importance for climate change, environmental issues, and Russian-Chinese relations. We will also consider Siberia's role in both the rise and possible fragmentation of Russia.

NEW LW-515 | ***Hidden Influences: Lost Literary Gems of the Twentieth Century** with Richard Klin

6 sessions | 3/4 - 4/8 | 1:45 PM - 3:45 PM | \$90 | [Online](#); [Recorded](#)

This class will survey four works of fiction from the twentieth century that are pivotal and enduring in the literary lexicon and the culture at large — but that are largely unread by modern audiences. We will discuss these books in the context of their time. The books are noted on the *Required/Recommended Books & Supplies* center insert.

NEW OO-031 | **The Lost Generation** ([Osher Online](#)) with Ferdâ Asya, PhD

6 sessions | 4/15 - 5/20* | 3:00 PM - 4:30 PM | \$68 | [Online](#);

This course will examine the cultural transformations in thinking and living that reshaped America and Western Europe between World War I and the Great Depression. Known as the Roaring Twenties, the Jazz Age, and the Lost Generation, this period redefined values and norms. We will explore the vibrant world of 1920s Paris through F. Scott Fitzgerald's *Babylon Revisited* and Bernice Bobs' *Her Hair*, Ernest Hemingway's *The Sun Also Rises*, and Gertrude Stein's *The Autobiography of Alice B. Toklas*, considering the lasting legacy of the era.

NEW OO-029 | **Music: Controversies and Curiosities (Osher Online)** with Emanuel Abramovits, MBA
6 sessions | 4/15 - 5/20* | 5:00 PM - 6:30 PM | \$68 | **Online**

Music has long provoked debate, from Beethoven and Stravinsky's bold innovations to Broadway works like *Annie Get Your Gun* and *South Pacific*, now revisited through modern concerns about race, consent, and gender. Is political correctness enriching art or erasing cultural heritage? We will also examine plagiarism and borrowing in pop and film music, with cases involving The Beatles, Pink Floyd, and Peter Frampton. This course blends audiovisuals, anecdotes, and humor to explore music's most controversial moments.

THURSDAY COURSES

AH-433 | **Scandals and Controversies in Classical Music and Hollywood Music** with Emanuel Abramovits

5 sessions | 3/5 - 4/2 | 8:30 AM - 10:00 AM | \$56 | **Online; Recorded**

Let's analyze controversial musical works involving Beethoven, Stravinsky, Caje, Wagner, Mahler, Williams and others in the classical field and in movie music. Revolutionary pieces that challenged established norms, created discord, scandal and censorship will be discussed.

HW-413 | **Chair Yoga Stretch and Balance Practices for Health and Wellbeing** with Roxann Riskin

10 sessions | 3/5 - 5/7 | 10:15 AM - 11:45 AM | \$112 | **Online**

Most conversations about aging focus on lifespan, but brainspan (how long our mind stays sharp) matters more.
